Your child loves songs and nursery rhymes!

Singing nursery rhymes helps little ones develop language, vocabulary and numeracy skills

Babies and children love to hear your voice and it's a great way to bond



Nursery rhymes help children to develop social, physical and emotional skills

Children love the repetitive language and actions of rhymes



Try singing this favourite!

If you're happy and you know it clap your hands. [clap twice] If you're happy and you know it clap your hands. [clap twice]

If you're happy and you know it, and you're really want to show it, if you're happy and you know it clap your hands. [clap twice]

Repeat the verse swapping 'clap your hands' for different movements or phrases such as:

- Stamp your feet [stamp feet twice]
- Say Hooray "Hooray"
- Do all 3 [clap, clap, stamp, "Hooray"]
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Make your own nursery rhyme and song bag or box at home

- Gather some toys/props/pictures from around the home and place in a pillowcase or box - choose items you can relate to nursery rhymes
- Pass the bag or box round your family or group of children while saying/ singing: Pass the bag around, round and round, round and round. Pass the baa around, round and round, where will it stop?
- 3 On 'stop', encourage the child holding the bag to close their eyes and pick out an item

- 4 Ask them what the item is and if they know a song about it – you can also suggest one - say "shall we sing it together?"
- 5 Sing the rhyme or song, then sing it again - repetition is good!
- 6 Pass the bag around again to find another song, then repeat
- 7 When you have sung a song for every item, chat together about which song they liked the most then sing it again!



Here are some of our favourites to sing at home



(use a toy rabbit or picture in your bag)

See the little bunnies sleeping til it's nearly noon Shall we wake them with a merry tune?

Five Little Speckled Frogs

(use a toy frog, bug or picture)

Five little speckled frogs, Sat on a speckled log. Eating some most delicious bugs.

Yum yum!

One jumped into the pool, Where it was nice and cool,

Then there were four speckled frogs. Glub alub!

Repeat the verse starting with four frogs and continue until there are "no more speckled frogs"!

Tiny Turtle

(use a toy turtle, tortoise, reptile or picture) You could blow bubbles during this rhyme for your child(ren) to pop at the end

I have a tiny turtle, his name is Tiny Tim I put him in the bathtub to see if he could swim He drank up all the water and ate a bar of soap Now he's lying in his bed, with bubbles in his throat! Bubble, bubble, bubble Bubble, bubble, bubble ... POP! [Clap] ()
