- Make sure you've got enough of the answer sheet s and picture round sheets printed out beforehand
- Make sure you have enough pens for people to borrow.
- Plan when you will collect/mark the picture round? We suggest leaving it on tables/giving it out when people pay and then marking it halfway through, with the first few rounds.
- Consider if you're going to have a break halfway through we suggest pausing after the history round and marking general knowledge, history and the picture round.
- Think about how you want to do the marking perhaps everyone swaps sheets and you read out the answers, and then you check the winning team's sheet to make sure it's marked correctly.
- Are you going to have a prize for the winner? Can you get it donated by the venue you're holding the quiz in, or by a local business?

These are just our suggestions. This is your quiz and if you want to do it differently in any way, please feel free to do so. The main thing is that everyone enjoys the event and that you raise as much as you can to support the work of the National Literacy Trust.
